Human Tissue Authority (HTA)

Important regulatory changes regarding the import or export of human tissues and cells between Great Britain (GB) and the European Economic Area (EEA) for the dental sector.

These changes may affect dental practices that previously did not require a HTA licence. Some products used in the placement procedure of dental implants are examples of human tissue products used in dentistry, these include but are not limited to:

- cancellous bone particles;
- demineralised bone matrix (DBM);
- DBM putty;
- pericardium; and
- skin and dermal tissue products.

Regulatory changes came into effect following the end of the UK Transition Period. If you import or export human tissues and cells between GB and a country in the EEA for human application (patient treatment), <u>you may need a HTA licence</u> by **1 July 2021.**

The regulatory changes **do not** apply to organisations in GB (England, Scotland and Wales) ordering human tissues and cells from suppliers in the UK already licensed by the HTA.
